Influential Women

Ada Lovelace: English mathematician and writer who is considered the world's first computer programmer

Amelia Earhart: Record-breaking American aviator and women's rights advocate who was the first woman to fly solo across the Atlantic Ocean

Anne Frank: German-born Jewish girl whose diary recording her time in hiding during the Holocaust has become a literary classic and powerful reminder of the horrors of war

Aung San Suu Kyi: Burmese politician, diplomat, author, activist and Nobel Prize recipient for her non-violent struggle for democracy and human rights

Bessie Coleman: American aviator who was the first Black woman and first Native American to hold a pilot's license

Billie Jean King: American tennis player who made significant contributions to women's professional tennis and is considered one of the greatest tennis players of all time

Cleopatra: Powerful and adept Egyptian queen and one of the most famous female rulers in history

Ella Baker: Civil and human rights activist who is recognized as one of the key figures of the American civil rights movement

Emily Dickinson: American poet whose writing challenged literary and social conventions of her time

Emmeline Pankhurst: British activist and suffragette movement organizer who helped women to win the right to vote in 1918

Florence Nightingale: English nurse, statistician and social reformer whose philosophies formed the modern nursing profession

Harriet Tubman: American abolitionist and social reformer who after escaping slavery herself helped others to escape via the Underground Railroad

Helen Keller: American author, activist, and disability rights advocate who was deaf and blind herself

Indira Gandhi: First female prime minister of India

Jane Austen: English author whose novels critiqued the class, status, and gender barriers of her time

Jane Goodall: English ethologist, conservationist, and animal welfare advocate who is best known for her extensive studies on chimpanzees

Joan of Arc: French national heroine and young peasant girl who led the French army to Victory during the Hundred Years' War

Madonna: American singer, songwriter, activist, and philanthropist who made innovative contributions to music production, songwriting, and visual presentation

Mae Jemison: American engineer, physician, and NASA astronaut who became the first Black woman to travel to space

Malala Yousafzai: Pakistani activist and recipient of a Nobel Peace Prize

Marie Curie: Polish-born physicist and chemist who made groundbreaking discoveries about radioactivity

Mary Shelley: English novelist, women's rights advocate, and social reformer whose novel *Frankenstein* is considered one of the first works of science fiction

Oprah Winfrey: American talk show host, television producer, actress, author, and philanthropist who broke down many barriers for Black women in the media industry

Princess Diana: British royal and international icon known for her social activism and humanitarian work

Queen Victoria: Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland whose reign of over 63 years defined the Victorian Era

Rosa Parks: American civil rights activist who is credited with starting the civil rights movement by refusing to give up her bus seat to a white man

Ruth Handler: American business magnate, inventor of the Barbie doll, and co-founder of Mattel toy company

Sacagawea: Young Shoshone woman who served as a vital guide and interpreter for the Lewis and Clark expedition

Sally Ride: American physicist and NASA astronaut who was the first American woman to visit space

Shirley Chisholm: American politician and first Black woman to be elected to the United States Congress

Simone de Beauvoir: French novelist, feminist, and major figure in French existentialism best known for her work *The Second Sex*

Virginia Woolf: British author and essayist whose experimental novels exerted a major influence on the modernist literature movement
